VA Life Insurance Changes

Important changes are coming to VA life insurance programs. Veterans Affairs Life Insurance (VALife) is launching on Jan. 1, 2023, as a new guaranteed acceptance whole life insurance programs for service-connected veterans. VA's current offering for serviceconnected veterans — Service-Disabled Veterans Life Insurance (S-DVI) — closes to new enrollment after Dec. 31, 2022. Veterans currently enrolled in S-DVI may keep their coverage or switch to VALife.

While both VALife and S-DVI cover veterans with any level of service-connected disability (0-100%), there are key program differences to consider before deciding what program is right for you.



Get the Facts About Mental Health and Security Clearances

Seeking mental health support does not pose a risk to gaining or keeping a national security clearance, but experiencing a mental health crisis could. In fact, seeking support can help you resolve underlying mental health issues that could negatively affect you, your family, or your career. Disqualification for security clearance, based on seeking mental health treatment, is highly unlikely based on data from millions of security investigations at every security level reviewed by

the Defense Counterintelligence and Security Agency that goes to DCSA. (https://www.dcsa.mil)

Majority of Revoked or Denied Clearances Based on Other Concerns

DCSA, whose mission is to ensure anyone receiving a Department of Defense security clearance is "reliable, trustworthy, of good conduct and character, and of complete and unswerving loyalty to the United States," analyzed more than 7.7 million cases DCSA reviewed from 2013 to 2023. Barely 1/100th of 1% of cases that resulted in denials or revocations were due to psychological health and additional conditions.

"Our finding continues to indicate the rarity of adverse actions due solely to psychological conditions," said Priester.

"Our data provide strong support to underscore the point that even if you have a condition that is required to report to security, the chances that you will achieve or maintain eligibility are quite high—especially if you are following medical recommendations for your care," Priester said.

"Most notably, no cases that led to a denial or revocation were only for seeking behavioral health care," he said. Of the 1,165 cases that resulted in a denial or revoked clearance, none of the decisions were solely for seeking mental health care but were for one or more other concerns. The data were last updated on April 27, 2024.

You are the music, In our hearts. The medicine when we're sick, Help us learn our parts.



HEALTH SERVICES COLLEGIATE PROGRAM (HSCP)

The Health Services Collegiate Program is designed to provide financial incentive for students to complete their Health Care Profession's education and obtain a commission in the Medical Service Corps (MSC) or Dental Corps (DC).

Benefits:

Active duty status as an Officer Candidate First Class (OCPO1)/E6. Receive a monthly military salary anywhere from \$3280 to \$5610* /month while attending school:

- Navy HSCP housing allowance based on school location. Increased offer amounts available in areas with higher cost of living
- A comprehensive health-care benefits package.
- Time in this program counts towards your Navy retirement.
- Earn vacation while in this program. 30 days a year!
- The ability to pay for tuition, books, and other school expenses.

Eligibility Requirements:


- Citizenship Must be a U.S. Citizen
- Age Complete your degree by age 42
- · Health Must meet the Navy's physical requirements
- Education Must be enrolled in, or accepted for transfer into an accredited college, university or school of study for the degree level required for your designated health profession. You must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or above to apply. Must complete studies/training as full time students attending all normal school sessions, and must maintain a GPA above 3.0 after selection.
- Degree/certification requirements must be fulfilled within the time frame designated by your health profession. Selectees must have an approved degree/course of study completion plan

Service Obligation:

• Year for year with a minimum obligation of three years active duty.

NURSE CANDIDATE PROGRAM (NCP) NURSE CORPS

The Nurse Candidate Program (NCP) is a financial assistance program for students enrolled in a baccalaureate nursing program. Upon completion of degree requirements, the student must accept a commission as a Nurse Corps (NC) officer.

Benefits

- Up to \$58,000 total incentive while attending school.
 - Up to \$20,000 signing bonus PLUS;
 - \$1,000 a month (maximum 24 months)

Eligibility Requirements:

- · Citizenship Must be a U.S. Citizen.
- Age Complete your degree by age 42
- Education Must be enrolled in, or accepted for transfer into a nursing school accredited by either the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) or the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN). Must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or above to apply. Must complete studies/training as full time students attending all normal school sessions (2 semesters or 3 quarters), and must maintain a GPA of above 3.0 after selection.
- Degree requirements must be fulfilled within 24 months.

CURRENTLY SEEKING APPLICANTS WHO WILL BE GRADUATING DEC 2025 or later!!

Service Obligation:

• Students who receive 13-24 months of payment will incur a 5 year obligation, and those who receive 1-12 months will incur a 4 year obligation.


Potential fraud indicators

It can be difficult to spot fraudulent QR code scams, but there are a few key items to look for before scanning any type of QR code:

• Misspellings and grammatical errors in the hyperlink address, company name or text accompanying the code.

- A shortened URL link.
- Unsolicited QR codes from unexpected or unknown senders.
- Discoloration or changes in a company logo.
- QR code stickers placed on top of ads.
- Overseas investment opportunities requesting payment by Bitcoin.
